Numbers 16 – Korah Rebellion

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Introduction

There is a lot going on in this chapter, but the genesis of this article was to write about what happens at the end where it describes the plague of YHVH going out amongst the people and Moses, apparently on his own initiative, intervenes and stops the plague. This was interesting because I questioned whether Moses had the authority to do this or not.

Num 16:1-3

Narrative

Num 16:41: The people make a charge against Moses of killing those involved in the Korah Rebellion

Commentary

I don't think you can understand the mindset of Korah and his conspirators unless you consider the context of which happened a couple of chapters earlier. In Numbers 13 & 14, the Israelites spied out the land before entering it and the spies came back with the Evil Report. This report was evil because it blasphemed YHVH in that it diminished his name i.e. his power and authority to be with them when they take the land. As a result they were judged by YHVH and were given a death sentence. That judgment was pleaded out by Moses to become a sentence of life in prison with no chance of parole. They would be held captive in the wilderness and their "carcasses be wasted in the wilderness" while their children watch and wait for the 40 years to end.

If you can accept that the context of the Korah rebellion needs to be put into context of the judgment given to them as a result of the Evil Report (Num 13 &14),

Num 16:41-50 Commentary

<u>Narrative</u>

- Num 16:41: The people make a charge against Moses of killing those involved in the Korah Rebellion
- Num 16:42: The people act like a mob and gather against and the glory of YHVH appeared
- Num 16:45: YHVH instructs Moses and Aaron to separate themselves from the mob so that they may be consumed ^{H3615 kalah} in a moment ^{H7281 rega}.
- Num 16:46-50: Moses, <u>apparently on his own initiative</u>, instructs Aaron to go out amongst the rabble and make an atonement for them, and thus saving them (except for the 14,700) who died from YHVH's plague.

Commentary

Is Moses acting without authority, and contrary to what YHVH wished which was to "consume them in a moment"? At the end of this conflict is YHVH pleased with Moshe's actions? The scriptures do not explicitly say that one way or another. Using a parent metaphor, is YHVH reacting like an angry father against his children who are being completely disrespectful of the mother being played by Moses. And through the actions of Moses, acting like that of a merciful mother towards her children, stop the punishment at least in part? This seems to me to be a reasonable metaphor.

For me, the more interesting commentary I would point out is one coming from the perspective of law. Specifically the charge that the mob make against Moses for murdering their fellow Israelites. What this incident allows is an opportunity to demonstratively show the contrary. (Except for the 14,700) his (and Aaron's) actions in fact save them from the judgment of YHVH. A clear shadow picture of Y'shua.

Fear of God: Some people suggest that the fear of God should be thought of as to revere God. Our ancestors in the desert, as a result of the Korah rebellion, got a major dose of raw FEAR of God.
