From [G1249](#); attendance (as a servant, etc.); figuratively (eleemosynary) aid, (official) service (especially of the Christian teacher, or technically of the diaconate): - (ad-) minister (-ing, -tration, -try), office, relief, service (-ing).

## **G1249 Deacon, *diakonos*.**

Probably from δίακω diakō (obsolete, to *run* on errands; compare G1377); an *attendant*, that is, (generally) a *waiter* (at table or in other menial duties); specifically a Christian *teacher* and *pastor* (technically a *deacon* or *deaconess*): - deacon, minister, servant.

LXX: H5288 naar, H8334 sharat pi.
