Some Verses

Gen 25:20-23 - Rebekah children struggled together within her

And Isaac was forty years old when he took Rebekah to wife, the daughter of Bethuel the Syrian of Padanaram, the sister to Laban the Syrian. And Isaac intreated the LORD for his wife, because she *was* barren: and the LORD was intreated of him, and Rebekah his wife conceived. And the children struggled together within her; and she said, If *it be* so, why *am* I thus? And she went to enquire of the LORD. And the LORD said unto her, Two nations *are* in thy womb, and two manner of people shall be separated from thy bowels; and *the one* people shall be stronger than *the other* people; and the elder shall serve the younger.

Strong's: From an unused root probably meaning to *clog* by tying up the fetlock; *fettering* ^b (by beauty); *Ribkah*, the wife of Isaac: - Rebekah.

Rebekah comes from an unused root

Most times in scripture a reason is given for the name of a person, but not with Rebekah. Probably because she is not part of the main biblical patriarch and also because, many times the meanings of the names for woman are not given.

So I decided to look up the name to get a better sense of the meaning. I thought it was interesting that they did give a meaning but had to resort to words not found in Scripture, as Strong's says "from an unused root". Anyway, I thought it would be interesting to list the words in Strong's for the words that are before and after. (This is a reasonable thing to do because the Strong's numbers were generated from listing Hebrew words alphabetical ("Aleph-Bet-ically" if you will allow me to use my newly invented language "Hebr-E-nglish").

Hebrew Letter meanings (symbolic/literal) of Rebekah's name (Resh, Bet, Koof)

Resh: person, head, highest (head)
Bet: household, in (House Tent)

Koof: behind, last, least (back of head)

What stuck out to me...

- An illusion to the head is found in the beginning and the end of the root
 - Using the same to letters, there is an illusion to highest (first?) (head) and last/lease (back of head)
- Tent is the middle root which reminds me of "...Jacob was a plain man, dwelling in tents." Gen 25:27

BDB Definition:

Rebekah = "ensnarer"

1) daughter of Bethuel, sister of Laban, wife of Isaac, and mother of Esau and Jacob

Part of Speech: noun proper feminine

A Related Word by BDB/Strong's Number: from an unused root probably meaning to clog by tying up the fetlock
